For being willing to work with all first through fifth graders on building successful learning communities concepts to hopefully get us all off to a great start this year.

Welcome back! I hope you are all ready for a great new year. As I said multiple times last year, we need to do something different to make things go more smoothly this year. I have a number of ideas. Of course one of them has to do with Learning Communities.

With a lot of help from the PE department the plan is to go through a sequence of activities with all students in grades 1 through 5 to develop trust, problem-solving skills and willingness to take academic risks. We also plan to develop and teach a standardized set of rules for playground games so that students have more positive options during recess.

I will send out a newsletter each week to let you know what the kids are doing and provide you with some questions to ask them after PE to cement their learning and help them apply the learning in the classroom and on the playground.

This week in PE we are beginning our sequence as all learning communities sequences should begin, with warm-up activities. We also will teach a playground activity that can be used at recess.

Learning Targets include: Learn PE ground rules (Digital Contract), names, playground game

Suggested questions that I would greatly appreciate you ask your class:

- What is the "Digital Contract?"
- Do you think the "Digital Contract" works?
- How could the "Digital Contract" work in our classroom?
- What activity did you learn that you could do at recess?
- What did Mrs. Stanton and Mr. Duchow do to get your attention?
- How do you think that might work in our classroom?


I need stories. Last year was tough. Not many funny stories to share.

So the boss was gone all last week. I think she's gonna be sorry. While she was away Richard got a promotion. When they saw him, two kids from Hallinan's class said in unison, "Hi Computer Wizard!" I suspect he's expecting a raise...

This week in PE we are continuing with warm-up activities, getting to know each other better as well as reviewing our Digital Contract (Full Value Contract). In addition, the first and second graders will continue to learn the rules for Hop Scotch while students in grade three through five learn rope jumping with songs.

Learning Targets include: Learn good sportsmanship, get to know others better, learn hop scotch or rope jumping activities to use at recess.

Suggested questions for discussion you may ask your class:

- What did you learn about someone else in class?
- Why is it important to know things about your classmates?
- How can knowing your classmates better help you in class?
- What is the "Digital Contract?"
- How do you play Hop Scotch?
- Do you think you will play Hop Scotch at recess?
- Did you learn some rope jumping activities you will try out at recess?

Listen carefully to their answers. You just might get a kick out of what you hear. I like to have kids hold each other accountable for their Full Value Contract. I was conducting a discussion with some 1st graders, and one was helping out the other with appropriate talk:

Boy 1 out of the blue: "Wedgie"

Boy 2: "Dude, no one wants to hear that"

I was recently reading a list of "Useful Phrases for Work." This one particularly hit home: The fact that no one understands you doesn't mean you're an artist. It's tough when reality hits you square in the face... Another one that jumped out was: I'm not being rude. You're just insignificant. This reminds me of what I started talking with the kids about his during PE last week. We have many students that do not make eye contact or any type of response when walking down the hall/sidewalk and are greeted by an adult. I am often completely ignored (I'm hoping that I'm not that insignificant around here) unless I stop the student and specifically invite them to respond. I have begun to instruct the students during PE to be sure and respond with "Good Morning" or "Hi" when greeted by an adult. I would appreciate it if you would reinforce this. I think Haller should be a friendly welcoming place.
